# **PUBLICATION POLICY**

#### 1. Submissions

- (a) The Melbourne Journal of International Law ('MJIL') encourages the submission of works dealing with public or private international law issues in a variety of styles, including articles, case notes, commentaries, review essays, book reviews, reflection and think pieces.
- (b) Authors are reminded that the MJIL has an international circulation and are therefore encouraged to ensure that the context of laws and policies are clearly explained.
- (c) The Editors will acknowledge receipt of submissions by email.
- (d) Submissions should be sent by email in Microsoft Word or a compatible format.
- (e) All authors are strongly encouraged to follow the latest edition of the Australian Guide to Legal Citation.
- (f) By signing this Policy, the author warrants that his/her submission:
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  - iv. does not violate rights of privacy and is neither libellous nor obscene.

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- (a) Referees will only be sought when a signed copy of this policy has been returned to the Editors.
- (b) Under editorial discretion, submitted articles will be forwarded to at least two (2) appropriate referees who will be requested to complete a referee's recommendation form.
- (c) Upon return of the submitted work from the referees, and in the light of the referees' reports, the Editors will inform the author of their decision regarding publication of the submitted work. The submission may be accepted for publication, conditionally accepted subject to amendments, requiring further development with an option to resubmit, or rejected.
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- (f) The final decision regarding publication and classification of a submission rests with the Editors. The Editors reserve the right to reconsider this decision at any stage throughout the publication process.

## 3. Editing Process

- (a) There will be a rigorous editing process, in which all parts of the submitted work, including quotes, footnotes and references, will be checked to ensure accuracy.
- (b) The submission will be edited for compliance with the AGLC and the MJIL style guide, and for consistency and clarity of expression.
- (c) Authors will receive an edited version of the submission for approval before publication. Authors undertake to respond with their approval in the timeframe specified. Although the Editors will endeavour to obtain approval from the author prior to publication, the author's failure to respond within the timeframe specified may be taken as approval of the edited version of the submission.

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## 5. Supply of Copy to the Author

(a) The author will be supplied one copy of the issue of the MJIL in which their contribution appears and a de-paginated soft-copy of their article. Additional copies of the Journal may be ordered at a cost.

**Article**: A detailed exploration of topical and engaging international law issues with a suitable methodology. The word length should be in the vicinity of 10 000 words (including an abstract of up to 250 words). We also accept articles both shorter and longer in length (up to 18 000 words).

**Case Note**: A detailed examination of developments in recent case law and its practical implications to that area of international law. The word length should be in the vicinity of 5000–7000 words.

**Commentary:** A discussion of significant, topical and recent international law developments and its practical implication to that area of law. The word length should be in the vicinity of 5000–7000 words.

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
