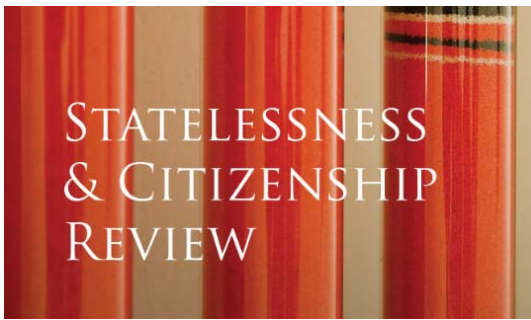
### Visiting Fellowship Scheme 2020

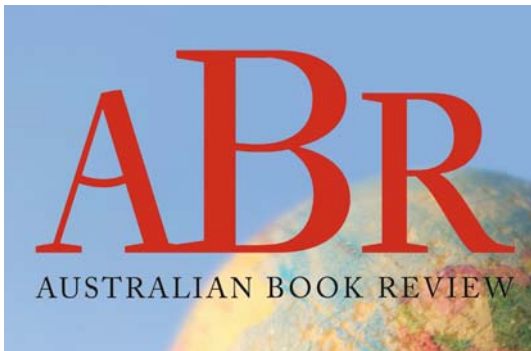
